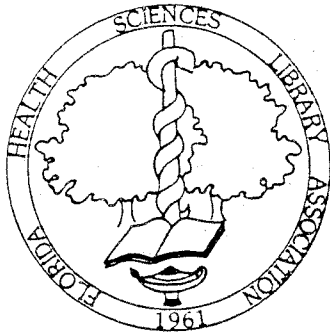

LIBRARIAN'S LOVEBOAT

I don't know about you, but the high point of my celebration of St. Patrick's Day occurred at precisely 1:05 p.m. on board the good ship First Lady, one hour out of Jacksonville Landing bound for Blount Island, when a wee, little elf of a man, all gotten up in an ice-cream colored suit, bright green necktie, and a pale green carnation in his lapel, careened out onto the pitching, swaying dance floor clutching a hand-held microphone in one hand and a large black looseleaf notebook in the other.

The wee, little elf of a man, fellow Hibernians, was yours truly, and the occasion was a gathering of 85 members of the Georgia and Florida Health Science Library Associations.

Some months earlier, in a moment of pure lunacy, I had agreed (not without some few, niggling misgivings) to speak to this assembly of dedicated Keepers of the Hippocratic Flame.

I am, as you may know, not averse to public speaking (indeed any kind of speaking--private, semi-private, you name it--I would deliver a discourse to a conclave of Pet Rocks if the price was right), but when the matter of being the luncheon speaker for a boat load of fun-loving librarians seeing Jacksonville for the first time was first broached, I felt small, icy talons clutching at my by-passed heart. The floating

setting, it seemed to me, was less than ideal for the kind of truly mesmeric performance that is my specialty, and I shyly suggested as much to the planners, but I was assured that an appropriate lectern for me to hide behind would be found and battened down, that a sound system worthy of Pavarotti would be at my disposal, and that, finally, my oratorical and comedic skills were such that I could, if I desired, transform a state funeral into a riotously funny happening, or make the inmates at Raiford glad, glad, glad that they were there.

In short, I blushingly accepted, and at the appointed hour, 11:45 a.m. on the 17th, I reported for duty on board the First Lady.

Lunch (two saltines and a small blueberry) was served smartly at 12:00 sharp and a two-person band, using the sound system discarded by Warner Brothers after the filming of the original Jazz Singer, struck up and made dismal, murky sounds for 45 minutes, interrupted every five minutes or so by the 1st mate who described city hall, the jail, the school board building, the Jacksonville Shipyard and sundry other flora and fauna along the shores of the St. Johns.

So at 12:45, the woman in charge of the Flame Keepers summoned the First Lady's hostess to inform her that Demosthenes, here, was in place and raring to go.

"Can't be done," said the hostess. "Sound system carries all over the First Lady."

Next deck up are 47 members of the 3rd Baptist Church of Gainesville who are enjoying the 1st mate's descriptions of the sights, and we have never done this before. And no, where did we get the idea there was a 'lectern?'"

I thought the hostess had several good points, but the arrangements had been made by someone, the hostess had been misinformed, and the lady in charge of Flame Keepers prevailed, so whether the 47 members of the 3rd Baptist Church up on the 2nd deck were ready or not, Jacksonville's gift to the world of library science was about to burst into full-throated, silver tongued speech.

It was an experience I shall never forget (or be able to repress). Holding my notebook of notes in one hand and the hand-held microphone in the other, I made my way out to the center of the heaving, swaying dance floor (6'x6' at the max). Twenty feet in front of me was one of the two bars that grace the First Lady, and there the two-person band, looking rather surly I thought, was hunkered down with several other gloomy passengers.

Directly over my head I saw a huge elliptical cutout in the deck that revealed six of the Gainesville 3rd Baptists leaning over a railing, peering down at me with puzzled expressions on their faces.

The dance floor pitched and swayed, the deisel engines roared like some gigantic, mortally wounded prehistoric beast and visions of Hieron-

ymus Bosch and Dante's Inferno danced in my head, but pride (which, as you know, always goeth before a fall) took hold and, opening my notebook with my teeth, I blew into the microphone, instantly resolved never to blow into a microphone again, and welcomed the 85 Georgia and Florida Health Science Librarians, as well as the 47 members of the 3rd Baptist Church of Gainesville, and said two or three thingsI don't remember clearly what...things suddenly became fuzzy, and the next thing I knew it was dusk. I was stretched out on my favorite lawn chair, and Jane was stroking my brow with a damp sponge and crooning softly, "You're as mad as a hatter, Billy Boy, as daft as the Ancient Mariner, but I love you baby, love you just the same."
