CALDER LIBRARY DEVELOPS SCHOOL OF MEDICINE WWW HOMEPAGE

In January, Tom Williams, Associate Director for Systems and Access Services at the Calder Library, began construction of the University of Miami School of Medicine Homepage to enable ready access to information at the School of Medicine and the many free, electronic resources of biomedical information on the World Wide Web(WWW), the Internet portion that supports hypertext (pictures, graphics, video, and sound).

Construction of the Homepage is a School-wide effort. Public Relations supplies general School of Medicine resources, such as admissions information, to the Library in electronic form where they are formatted for Mosaic software and integrated with graphics files created by Biomedical Communications. Homepages are developed by departments throughout the School and University and approved by Public Relations prior to their inclusion in the School's Homepage.

The Library, together with input from faculty, identifies useful sources of biomedical information, available throughout the nation and the world, and categorizes them by one of the options on the School's Homepage. Medical Network Services continues to accord access to the growing number of electronic resources via UMMEDNET and dial access.

CALDER ADDS NEW PATIENT INFORMATION FILES

Two new patient information files, produced by EBSCO Publishing, were recently acquired by the Library and made available, at no charge, on terminals in the Library, on UMMEDNET terminals throughout the medical campus, and via dial-up terminals from any remote location.

Updated quarterly, *Health Sources* contains the full-text of hundreds of pamphlets written for the

consumer; hundreds of articles, published in the past three years, in 34 consumer health journals; plus citations and abstracts of articles in more than 160 health-oriented journals.

Personal Medical Advisor contains the full text, including diagrams and images, of seven health treatment books written by health professionals for patients and consumers: Complete Guides to Sports Injuries; Symptoms, Illness, & Surgery; Prescription and Non-Prescription Drugs; Pediatric Symptoms, Illness & Medications; Medical Tests; Vitamins, Minerals, & Supplements; and Drugs, Vitamins & Minerals in Pregnancy.

These are the first electronic sources acquired for the Ellen Gartenfeld Health Information Network by Network Coordinator Joaquin (Joe) Arriaga.

JAHIL TO USE DOCLINE FOR LOCAL INTERLIBRARY LOANS

The Jacksonville Area Health Information Libraries consortium is in the process implementing the use of Docline for interlibrary loans among the members. At present members locate the site of materials by using LUIS and then calling or faxing requests to that library. Request slips are handwritten, not always legibly nor completely, and statistics are tabulated manually. Much of the groundwork has already been laid. Members have LIBIDS and their holdings are included in SERHOLD. The group will meet at the end of March to fill out their routing tables. Several members are also interested in participating in SEND. Requests from borrowing libraries outside the JAHIL consortium will still be received by Borland library, rather than directly by the individual library. We think that this will be a much more efficient way to handle ILLS citations should be complete and accurate and we will be provided with quarterly and annual statistics.


UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA ANNOUNCES "WELLNESS AFTER 50" GRANT


The University of Florida Health Science Center Library in conjunction with the Alachua County Library District announces the funding of "Wellness After 50," a new grant designed to improve both libraries' book collections and to promote library awareness among users 50 years of age or older. This group has specific health information needs that will be targeted through publication of booklists, purchase of new library materials, and cooperation with other agencies that work with this population. This grant will permit the public library staff to take advantage of the expertise of the Health Science Center Library's staff. This attempt to make library users more informed consumers of medical conditions, health care services, and individual personal responsibility is a growing trend in the United States. As the general population ages, their information needs become more medically oriented and this grant is a response to that need. One result will be that both the Alachua County Library District Headquarters Library and the University of Florida Health Science Center Library will have specific titles that are being promoted available to their patrons using their facilities.
