Tallahassee Community College Ghazvini Center for Healthcare Education Library & Learning Commons

I am Natalee Reese, the new Health Sciences Librarian at Tallahassee Community College as of July 1, 2015. My predecessor, Gregg Stevens, now at Mercer University in Atlanta, is the person who told me about FHSLA. I serve the Division of Healthcare Professions (HCP), which includes Dental Assisting, Dental Hygiene, EMT/Paramedic, Nursing, Pharmacy Technology, Radiologic Technology, Respiratory Care, and Surgical Services. I am primarily located at the Ghazvini Center for Healthcare Education, but I am part of the larger TCC Library team. This is my first specialized position; in the past, I have been a general Reference & Instruction Librarian at the University of South Carolina Beaufort (near Hilton Head Island), and before that I was an adjunct Reference & Instruction Librarian at Lansing Community College in Michigan, and Indiana Institute of Technology (Indiana Tech), in Fort Wayne, Indiana. My MLS is from Indiana University-Purdue University Indianapolis (IUPUI), and I have a B.A. in English from Purdue University.

Finally, TCC is on the cusp of launching its **RN-to-BSN program**, which will be 100% online, so that is a new challenge for me professionally and for us institutionally. We received our initial SACS accreditation last week and as of right now, it is anticipated that classes will begin in March 2016.



Topics included in the series are introduction to the “born digital” concept, space planning, staffing, budget, LCME requirements, and more.


Information Anywhere




Allison attended the FACRL meeting in Gainesville on Tackling the Textbook Problem: Leveraging Library Resources and OERs to Reduce Costs.

There I witnessed firsthand just how much information a hospital needs to function, how quickly that information changes, and how important it is to keeping patients safe and healthy. I was hooked.

Why did you join FHSLA and is it the same reason you are a member today?

I joined FHSLA because I started working at the University of Florida. As part of a land-grant university with affiliates like IFAS that are located throughout Florida, the Health Science Center Libraries understands its role serving the entire state, and what better way to serve than to get to know my medical librarian colleagues and the challenges they face? Collaboration requires communication, if you want to get alliterative about it, and FHSLA is as much of a communication hub as any hospital switchboard.

What has been your biggest professional challenge?

One challenge that I first experienced at Seattle Children's and continue to experience here at UF is

being able to balance urgent, short-term needs and tasks with the less-urgent but more-important long term goals of my position. It's hard to eat the proverbial elephant when putting out metaphorical fires.

Whom do you admire?

It is terribly cliché, but no less true for it, but I admire my mother most. She was the principal for a small school that served a diverse array of families in the South Florida community for nearly a decade before returning to librarianship, and the impact that she has on families, especially those most in need of the safe learning space that a children's library provides, is immeasurable. She can't go out to eat without hearing cries of "Miss Cindy!" and getting hugs from the kids in her reading programs.

Is there anything about you that others might be surprised to know?

Despite being a 3rd-generation Floridian raised in Lake Worth, and having vacationed just about everywhere in the state, I've never been to the Keys. I know, tragic.

Library Spotlight: Virtual Tour of the Harriet F. Ginsburg Health Sciences Library

The Harriet F. Ginsburg Health Sciences Library opened its doors in 2009 as a 98% digital library. We had only 41 medical students in our Charter Class, and not many more faculty. Even in those early days the library was heavily used by our students, despite being in a tiny space.



In 2010, we moved into our beautiful new 10,000 sq. ft. space on the second floor of the medical education building of the University of Central Florida College of Medicine (UCF COM) at the Lake Nona Campus in Orlando. Our library now serves 460 medical students, 157 residents, 30 full-time faculty, 1,300 affiliated faculty, and 802 volunteer faculty. The library is also open to the general public Monday through Friday, 8am to 5pm. While our motto is *"Information Anywhere, Anytime, on Any Device,"* we encourage our users to come to our library to meet their information, technology, and studying needs.






We've come a long way from our early days in a room at UCF's main campus. Today users are greeted outside our doors by our dazzling 80" touch screen display. Here we feature information about library resources, services, and events, along with fun library and medicine information. The library is open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, to UCF COM students and faculty, who all have card-swipe access.




Inside the library has a single-point service desk where all circulation and basic reference occurs. Four front desk staff members rotate through the day (shifts are preset for the month) and all library staff are trained to provide basic technology and reference assistance. The desk is staffed Monday through Friday, 8am to 5pm. **Fun fact:** the most circulated items in our library are not books, but laptops and mobile device chargers!



Behind the circulation desk, you can see our small Reference collection.



A giant 79" TV allows library users to follow the news of the day (just don't try to change the channel from CNN!). The hallway shown on the left leads to conference rooms, study rooms, and library staff offices.



Our library commons area is a popular area for students to study. There is a flood of natural light, and lots of windows overlooking a nature preserve. Because of its proximity to the library front desk, we tell our students to be aware that this is not the place for quiet study. We do have white noise machines available for use if the volume level gets to be too much. Typically the commons area is busy mid-morning and mid-afternoon, and is still relatively quiet even when full.



The commons area features six iMac stations around the two columns pictured left, available for anyone, including our public patrons.

We have two unique features in the commons area. One is our beautiful orchids (pictured below), which have been present in our library since we opened. The orchids are in honor of Harriet F. Ginsburg, for whom our library is named. **Fun fact:** Library Director Nadine Dexter, and Melodie Gardner, our Library Technical Assistant Specialist, do a fantastic job maintaining them.

The second unique feature of our commons area is the first of two charging stations (pictured below, left) available to library users. The stations allow both iOS and Android users to charge their devices, especially when the front desk is not staffed.



In the fall of 2014 we realized that our quiet study room was becoming as popular as the commons area. With another 120 students in the incoming class, we were quickly running out of study space. Throughout the 2015 school year, we worked with Library Interiors of Florida, Inc. to plan a renovation of the quiet room, which would consolidate shelving housing our circulating book collection, add more study carrels, and increase our Reserve collection space.


In November of 2015 we opened our newly renovated quiet space, formally known as the Julia J. Pet-Armacost, Ph.D. and Robert L. Armacost, D.Sc. Reading Room. The entire library space now seats approximately 101 people.



Left is a **BEFORE** picture of our quiet room. We previously had four short stacks of circulating books, and one small stack for our Reserve collection. **Fun fact:** while the glass wall between the quiet room and the commons area is not technically sound-proof, it is difficult to hear any noises in the common area while in the quiet room. This truly is our quiet space –you can hear a pin drop in there!



After the renovation, we added 14 additional study seats and changed the configuration of the existing furniture. The circulating collection was shifted and consolidated onto three stacks instead of four, while the History of Medicine collection was moved to its own small stack. We also doubled our Reserve collection space.





We have two unique features in the quiet room. The first is an Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant study table that can be raised and lowered to accommodate patrons in a wheelchair (pictured on the right). Many of our students enjoy raising the table all the way up and studying while standing up. A second charging station is available in the quiet room, next to the “ADA table.”

Another unique feature of the quiet room is the artwork on display throughout the space. **Fun fact:** All of the artwork in the library was created by UCF COM students, staff, faculty, and volunteer faculty.

The most popular feature of the newly renovated quiet space is the frosted glass along the entire length of the library space. The frosting gives users privacy while studying or having meetings in our conference rooms.



We hope you’ve enjoyed this virtual tour of the Harriet F. Ginsburg Health Sciences Library. Although our users can access our library resources “*Anywhere, Anytime, on Any Device,*” we still have a space that is inviting, comfortable, and beautiful, and that is very popular with our users. We hope you come visit us in the future!
