Greetings fellow FHSLA MEMBERS. The FHSLA 2017 meeting is approaching quickly and the program committee is pleased to announce what we hope will be a great line up.

The theme for the meeting is **Sharing Our Knowledge** and we'll have events for you to both learn from others and to share your own experiences.

Dates: **March 30 & 31, 2017**

Location: **Mayo Clinic, Jacksonville, FL**

We will have two CE offerings, based on your member survey responses. Thursday, March 30 will feature an optional class, **Searching Effectively & Efficiently**, taught by Terry Ann Jankowski. This course on searching will offer something for beginners and experts. Terry is well known for her MLA courses and workshops and this course is a modified version of one taught last year at the MLA annual meeting and in recent webinars. Those courses have received excellent reviews but cost hundreds of dollars. The additional charge for Terry's class is only \$35. This course earns attendees 4.0 CE.

Thursday evening, enjoy refreshments, an art tour, make some art of your own, and enjoy the company of both your FHSLA colleagues and dogs from the Caring Canines program in the Cannaday Atrium at the Mayo Clinic.

Our other CE class, Friday morning, will be included in the price of your meeting registration. This class should be helpful to everyone who needs to share information about their library's performance and its value to your university or hospital. Ashley Cuffia, from the NN/LM SEA, will present **Measuring Your Impact: Using Evaluation for Library Advocacy Resources** on Friday morning. This 3 hour CE is for all registered attendees. Ashley will also provide an NN/LM update.

You will also have the opportunity to share your own knowledge with your FHSLA colleagues. Please consider submitting a **poster** highlighting your research, innovation, or other interesting projects. Posters will be displayed electronically with a short presentation. The meeting will also have a **Roundtable Session**, featuring four simultaneous brief presentations and group discussions. Everyone will have a chance to attend each Roundtable. The topics will be *Creating Online Tutorials, Conference Roundups & Highlights, Teaching Evidence-Based Practice/Evidence-Based Medicine/Evidence-Based Nursing, and Systematic Reviews*. Come prepared to learn and share.

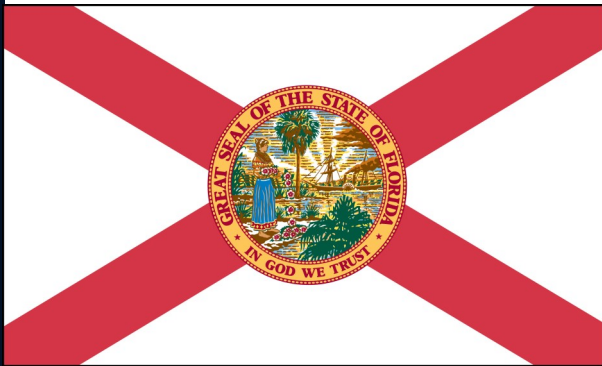

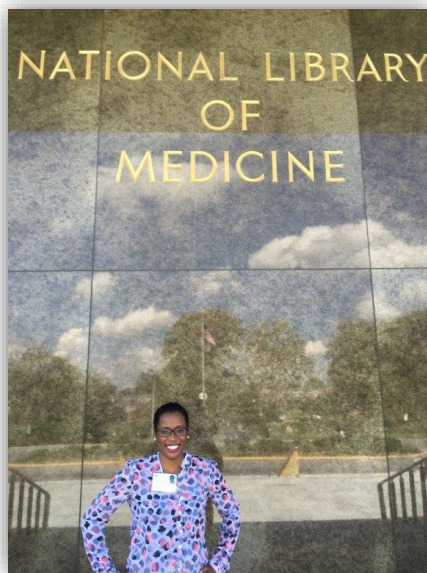

You may have seen something similar in various public places (e.g., airport bathrooms!). The smiley terminal allows the library to get feedback on an ongoing basis on any number of topics. We have asked questions including: "Did you get what you needed from the library today?", and "I would attend a similar event hosted by the library," and "I enjoyed the topic of today's lunch & learn session." Library patrons and event participants simply press the smiley that

corresponds to how they feel in response to the question asked. Questions are changed weekly or for a particular event. A web-based system allows us to view responses by date and time so we can analyze trends. The library is currently evaluating how useful this tool is for library assessment.

I am definitely a Facebook junkie! I signed up for Facebook when it was originally for college students only back in 2007, when I was in the middle of my bachelor’s degree. It has evolved tremendously since then and is a practically a part of my everyday life. I use it for finding, reading and sharing articles and information from a multitude of sources and media, probably more than as a communication medium.

What made you decide to become a medical/health sciences librarian?

I interviewed for a photography position at Calder Library right after graduating in 2010. Calder Library has a Biomedical Communications Department that employs two photographers and one position was open at the time. During the interview, the Library’s director encouraged me to apply for another open position in the Circulation Department. She felt that while they were looking for someone with more photography skills than I had at the time, my background in customer service made me a great candidate for managing the circulation department. I have been working in libraries ever since. I decided to pursue medical librarianship in earnest while working in my current position in Reference and Education, after gaining increasing librarian responsibilities within my department. I realized that I had been a “librarian in training” all along and it was time to make it official. I’m currently in my second semester at Florida State University’s online program, pursuing the Health Informatics track.

Why did you join FHSLA and is it the same reason you are a member today?

I was encouraged by my supervisor to attend the FHSLA annual conference at Nova in 2015 and enjoyed the CE’s and networking experiences. I attended the CE on social media in medical libraries that peaked my interest and led me to pursue my social media certificate. I had attended the 2015 conference as a non-member and decided it was time to join when the 2016 conference was

announced. I am hopeful that I can continue to use FHSLA's resources for career development and advancement.

What has been your biggest professional challenge?

Managing full time work with a part time master's degree has been a challenge for me. While I consider myself a multitasker, being out of formal school for 6 years and this being my first online degree, balancing both has taken some time to get used to. Also because I am part time, it will take a longer time to complete. However, my experiences in health libraries thus far has made the Health Informatics classes a lot easier to manage.

Whom do you admire?

I have been fortunate to meet some pretty amazing individuals in my life, so it is truly difficult for me to pick just one person! The people I admire the most are those who have been great teachers, advisors and mentors to me throughout my life; while still remaining humble and true to their own professional and personal goals. I am inspired by people who are tenacious and determined to succeed in spite of adversity.

Is there anything about you that others might be surprised to know?

I am a 2016-2017 ALA Spectrum Scholar. The ALA Spectrum Scholarship Program recruits and provides scholarships to underrepresented, minority students to assist individuals interested in obtaining a graduate degree and leadership positions within the profession. My particular scholarship is one of two sponsored by the NLM and MLA through this initiative. During the 2017 ALA Midwinter Meeting in Atlanta recently at a Spectrum networking event, I had the honor of meeting former ALA President and current Librarian of Congress, Dr. Carla Hayden. It was very exciting!

Although our space has gone from over 2,000 square feet down to about 1,200 square feet, our services continue to reach our patrons across the 7 central Florida campuses because most of our work is, and has always been, done electronically.

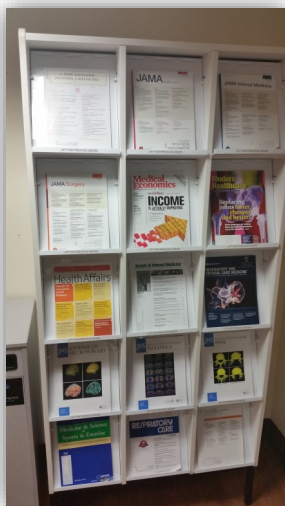
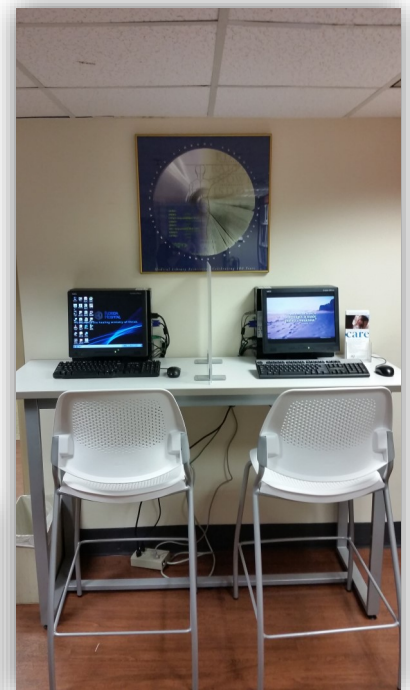
We had to discard most of our print content when we moved, including older bound (first photo above), loose print current journals (second photo), and circulating textbooks. When they found a space for us, the room was not set up for a library. What were once built-in storage cabinets (third photo above) were converted to shelving for the core reference books, because many at the hospital still prefer print when reading books (see lower-right photo). A carpenter came in and shored up the shelving and installed backstops so the books would stay at the front end of the deep shelves. This was more cost effective than tearing out the cabinets and building new shelves.



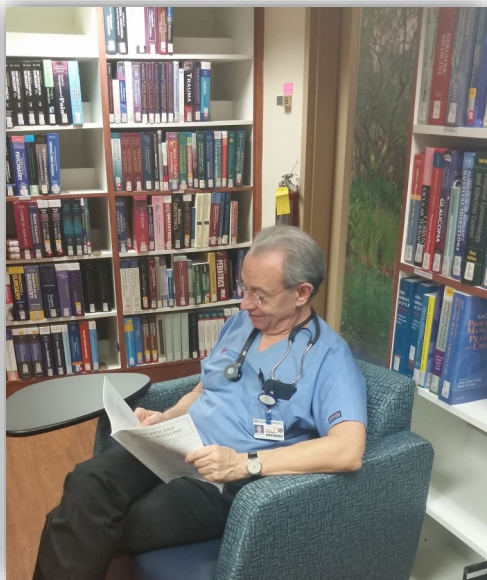
At the time of the final move, all the furniture in the library was refreshed and with the help of a designer, we made the best use of an awkward space. We purchased modern, smaller-scale furniture, that can be moved and rearranged to meet users' needs (right photo). One of the best purchases was the moveable dividers that take a large table and divide it into individual spaces. These frosted dividers also provide privacy between the computers that are rather close together.



The library staff got modular cubbies in a small office area that opens to the main library floor (left photo). Without the ability to add power in the middle of the room, we had to place computer stations around the perimeter. To add some variety, we selected a higher desk with tall chairs for one side of the room (right photo) and traditional height computer stations on the other side (bottom photo).



Although we provide access to over 2,500 electronic journals, we kept a small collection of print core journals for the current year that the physicians can pull and browse at their leisure. (left photo) We would have preferred to keep more than 15; however, the unit was the largest that would fit in the available space.



We have two plush reading chairs with built in desks that are used for laptops or reading (top left photo), and an area that we call “the shelf,” that holds 4 additional computers (bottom left photo).



We also refreshed our computers with larger monitors, added phones by most of the computers, and put up a large whiteboard and tack board for messages or information sharing (middle left photo). Our library is staffed Monday – Friday from 8 am – 4:30 pm, but access is available to clinicians 24/7. Our online presence is strong and we offer off-campus access and support to our resources, but it is nice to have a place for the hospital personnel to come, sit, read, research, and meet with us face-to-face.


